THE TROJAN WOMEN

Proscenium

by Euripides in a translation by Philip Vellacott

Euripides expressed his feelings of horror about aggressive warfare in his play THE TROJAN WOMEN performed in 415 BC. In it, he showed the tragic plight of the conquered women, particularly Hecuba, Cassandra and Andromache, passive victims of the aggressive Greek conquerors, victors of the legendary Trojan Wars.

Euripides used this heroic legend to demonstrate his revulsion at Athens' cruel attack on neutral Melos which had taken place just a year before in 416 BC.

Centuries later, women have taken up the fight against war, especially the struggle against nuclear weapons. They are not prepared any longer to be victims or passive members of an aggressive society.

PROSCENIUM have explored some of these themes in a prologue to *THE TROJAN WOMEN* — an improvisation based on a women's peace camp.
